Who is Atat Bali?

Atat Bali (*Trichoglossus forsteni mitchellii*), also called Perkici Dada Merah or known as Mitchell's Lorikeet, is a subspecies of the Sunset Iorikeet (*Trichoglossus forsteni*), once native to Bali and Lombok.

Nature's little pollinators - Feeding on nectar, pollen, and soft fruits with their unique bristle-tongues.



This critically endangered bird is thought to be nearly extinct in the wild.

The species was last sighted in the wild in 2019, according to field observations published by Prihatmoko et al. in BirdingASIA (2019). Since then, concerns over habitat loss and population decline have prompted urgent conservation action.
